


As we found our seats the volleyball players were warming up for the match. The first match was between the Dominican Republic and Japan. It was a close match but Japan won in 3 sets.

The Puffin with its 'Dinner Suit' of black and white feathers and coloured bill is one of Britain's most enchanting birds. It belongs to a family of seabirds called Auks which includes Razorbills and Guillemots, all of which hunt for fish beneath the surace.

When breeding, Puffins live in large colonies on the islands of the Orkneys and Shetlands. They are also abundant on the National Trust Reserve on the Farne Islands where they nest in burrows in the turf. They gather in numbers, standing very upright on their bright orange legs and webbed feet.

Their bills have an enormous capacity for fish, caught crossways. Puffins are not very skillful flyers and can fall prey to Great Black Backed Gulls and Great Skuas.

Floodline


The Environment Agency have asked the Parish Council to remind local residents about Floodline. This is a national service. available online and by phone, to alert people to the risk of flooding in their area. As you can see from the map, there are flood risk areas in London Colney. We all know about the River Colne but the ususally tiny London Colney Stream also poses a flood risk.

The London Colney Stream travels underground for most of its journey through London Colney. Try standing in the road at the junction of Kings Road and Peters Avenue at a quiet time of day or night and you can hear it rushing through under the manhole cover in the middle of the road.

Where it does emerge above ground between the OVs Rugby Fields and The Irish Club it quickly becomes overgrown and sometimes blocked by rubbish as it passes between Cotlandswick and the allotments, some of which flooded during the recent long wet spring. The Environment Agency are responsible for keeping the course clear but understandably resent clearing garden refuse and other waste so please use your green bin, not the stream, for garden trimmings.

The Environment Agency advise you to sign up to receive flood alerts and flood warnings if your home is in the area coloured blue on the map. Floodline Warnings Direct is a free service which





sends residents a direct message when flooding is expected and may affect your property. Flood warnings will give you time to prepare for flooding which could save you time, money and heartache. You can receive warnings by telephone, mobile, email, SMS text message or fax, whichever you prefer. As those who came to the Annual General meeting of The London Colney Local History Society on June 12th 2012 will know, we discussed some options for the future of this society, following the tragic loss of Wally late last year. It was decided that the Acting Chairman should take over the Chairman's role, while a new committee was created from existing members. It was stressed that without more volunteers coming forward to help manage the archives, research material, or contribute articles for The Record magazine, then all work will fall on very few people: no way to proceed and grow! We must look to a new campaign to recruit younger members, who may not yet realise what our local story should mean to those now living here... for we do have a tale to tell, and much evidence still lies around us waiting to be discovered anew by another generation.

As memories fade away, leaving only faint physical traces of the past, we are still noting recent changes as they occur. One day these minor events will become part of our history as we try to remember the way we were, about the time of the London Olympics in 2012. That was the year the M.25 was widened, and we lost our Police Station (see photo).

Last year, our Annual Exhibition covered the period during WW-2 when those

not directly engaged in the armed forces linked up to form The Home Front, with civilians of all ages working together for survival. As peace returned to Britain, big changes took place here, Our farms became mechanised, so rural skills were obsolete. Motor transport was replacing horses, new roads appeared, garages took over from ostlers. More houses were built, various hospitals flourished, new jet engines roared overhead, powering aircraft able to fly at the speed of sound and we helped to design and construct them until the modern airliners gave us the chance to see the world beyond this village. The Olympics is the theme for this year's exhibition on 13th and 14th October. We will be showing you some of our huge collection of photos and memorabilia. More Beans!

Good old pulses. Cheap and healthy, although they are widely used in the Middle East and the Mediterranean, I feel they are often overlooked in British cooking. Admittedly by themselves they can be uninspiring. However it only takes a little imagination and a couple of other ingredients and you can transform them into an array of exciting dishes. Here are some of my favourites...



Chickpea and Chorizo Stew

The buttery texture and nutty taste of chickpeas is a perfect foil to a piquant, spicy Moroccan-style stew.

Ingredients

400g tin of chopped tomatoes 400g tin of chickpeas x 2 2 medium onions 4-6 garlic cloves (depending on how brave you are!) 100-200ml chicken stock (depending on how thick you want it to be) ground paprika ground paprika ground turmeric ground chili ground fenugreek ground cinnamon fresh coriander 1 lemon 100g chorizo (sausage shape)

Method

Finely chop and fry onions in generous quantity of olive oil until satisfied. Add finely chopped garlic and ground spices. Be generous with paprika and turmeric, less generous with the fenugreek and, finally, very stingy with chili and cinnamon. Fry for 2-3 minutes.

Add chickpeas, tomato and stock and simmer on a low heat for at least 45 minutes. Taste and readjust spices if necessary.

Slice chorizo and put in a hot grill until crunchy.

Just before serving add some chopped coriander and a squeeze of a lemon. Serve with rice, crusty bread or couscous and the chorizo sprinkled on top.

The trick with this recipe is to simmer this dish for hours and hours; I would recommend slapping it in the slow cooker or reheating it the next day. The longer it cooks, the more the ingredients coalesce and the more intense the flavour becomes. You can add the chorizo in with the garlic and let it stew with the other ingredients

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adding depth to the dish.Today I decided to grill the chorizo until it was crunchy and black at the edges, the smell was so enticing that it's a miracle that the caramelising chorizo made it to the stew at all.Then I sprinkled it in top of the stew on each individual plate giving a crispy contrast to the creamy chickpeas.

I wanted a more refreshing side dish than rice to soak up the tasty stew. I settled for bulgur wheat and jazzed it up with diced cucumber, tomato, red onion, a drizzle of olive oil, squeeze of a lemon and as many fresh herbs as I could find (dill, mint and Greek basil). Recently Greek basil has surpassed coriander in my affections because of its irresistible scent. I used half a red onion and this turned out to be too overpowering so I'd definitely be more conservative next time.

The District Council have stopped supplying paper copies of plans to the Parish Council or to members of the public. We now view the plans online projected onto a large screen

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Gardening

I'm going to try not to mention the weather too much as it has, as ever, been the dominating factor in not just the garden this summer but also in many conversations and news bulletins. Despite, or perhaps because of the rain my garden has become particularly lush and overgrown. Having had a water meter installed we were able to set up the irrigation system, but even pots and containers were becoming waterlogged and so at times it has been turned off. Perhaps we will eventually have some sunshine, just a few days will do.



When I'm choosing plants for the garden I like to try and pick those which will encourage insects of all sorts. Insects, bees in particular are vital for pollination which is especially important for my small vegetable patch. Other insects such as ladybird and hoverfly larvae will eat the aphids which are damaging to precious crops. Butterflies and moths are beautiful to look at and enhance any garden. Plants with single flowers are best for attracting insects. Those plants that have been developed and cultivated with evermore elaborate and complicated petal patterns and arrangements will not be attractive as it is increasingly harder for the insect to find its way through the maze to reach any pollen that might be there.

In my garden, in spring the tiny pink flowers of cotoneaster horizontalis are a particular insect magnet and the purple flowers of honesty attract orange tip butterflies. Lavender, marjoram, thyme,

chives are all alive with all sorts of insects on a sunny summer day, as are catmint, eryngium, scabious and oxeyed daisies. I have found chives and oxeyed daisies in particular to be prolific self seeders so vigilance is needed with dead-heading. In later summer ice plant, fennel and verbena bonariensis are all attractants. I leave the flower heads on these throughout winter as they add some structure and birds, especially goldfinches enjoy foraging for their seeds. Smaller birds use the tall stems of fennel as a staging post on their way to the bird table. The flowers of mature ivy provide an important nectar source in autumn and on a sunny day are covered with bees and other insects building up their food for the winter.

I enjoy growing sweet peas alongside my vegetables because as well as encouraging vital pollinators to my beans and tomatoes, they are pretty to look at. They have to be picked almost daily to encourage continued flowering and it is delightful to have a posy filling the living room with their scent throughout the summer. I grow sweet peas from seed and for the last two summers I have experimented with starting these off indoors the previous October, then once germinated transferring them to the cold frame for the winter. Last year this appeared to have worked, but having planted them out in late winter, I had one or two early flowers, then they withered and I had a summer without sweet peas in either garden or house. Undaunted I tried again last October but I realised in good time that the autumn sowing was failing and so had just enough time to start off some more. These are doing much better, if a little late in flowering and in future years I will go back to spring sowing. I do not want to be without these useful insect attractors.

My garden would not be the same without its little winged visitors. There are bumble bees and honey bees, hoverflies and ladybirds the occasional dragonfly and many others. It is always a joy when a rare visitor flies in, a hummingbird hawk moth or a marbled white butterfly. I enjoy sitting and watching the comings and goings as each flower head in turn is explored for nectar. In the process the flowers will be pollinated and the cycle of propagation and growth continued. Along the way I may also be able to harvest some crops.

Coopers Wood

Coopers Wood is the new name for the area of woodland between Lowbell Lane, Thamesdale and The Colney Fox PH.

You may have noticed the enormous improvements made to this small area of woodland by the owners, Matthew Homes prior to handing it over to the Parish Council. They have thinned the trees, removing damaged, dying and overcrowded specimens and have replanted with substantial young native trees. The path through the wood is now broad and clear and a large amount of rubbish has also been removed. We hope that the increased light reaching the ground will promote the growth of native wildflowers. It would be good if the wood could support more wildlife although, as this patch of wood is isolated, it may take some time for new species to appear.

The Parish Council will now manage and maintain this wood on behalf of local residents. We have been given a small maintenance budget which, with your help, should enable us to keep the wood in good order.

The wood is to be called Cooper's Wood in memory of Robin Cooper who served London Colney as member and Chairman of the Parish Council for many years.

Please join us on Saturday 6th October at 10am at the Colne Gardens entrance to the wood for the formal handover and a short naming ceremony followed by refreshments at the Colney Fox.

Village Green Application

Herts County Council are considering the Parish Council's application to register the triangle of open land in Thamesdale as a Village Green. The land is also owned by Matthew Homes.

The area has planning permission for 14 flats but work on these cannot proceed until the County Council has made their decision.

The papers are with the County Council's lawyers. When they report in the Autumn, the County Council can decide whether to grant Village Green status.

We have just been awarded a grant from St. Albans District Council which will enable us to think about 2013 activities. Come along and join us - there is no obligation to continue if you find it is not for you.



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Wartime Friends

From a very early age, my 2 sisters, brother and I were brought up in Lowbell Lane, London Colney from 1940 where my father was employed on what was then known as Legerton's farm. With our parents we lived in a farm cottage in the upper part of the lane.

From a very young age, I was aware of a number of "strangely spoken" men who were called Prisoners of War and lived in a couple of adjoining cottages in the lower lane. They were a mix of both German and Italian POWs who came from a Prisoner of War Camp just outside Barnet in an area known as Trotters Bottom.

Above is a school photo of me in 1948 and below the group photograph shows my Father, George Chambers, Wilheim Dyke (Willie) the German POW and a boy called Teddy Rowlands. Taken on Legerton's farm, Lowbell Lane, in the late 40s during the brussel sprout picking season. Left to right is Teddy Rowlands, Wilheim Dyke and George Chambers.



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With other farm workers, my father worked alongside the POWs and soon became friends with them despite having language difficulties at first. This friendship was restricted somewhat because there was a time restriction when the P O Ws had to be in their cottages and no visitors were allowed after 6pm. If anyone ignored this rule they were quickly and certainly made aware of doing so by Mrs Angelina Childs who either took it upon herself to be the "Supervisor" of these gentlemen or had been asked by some official body, such as the War Office.

Every day, with either my siblings or friends, I saw the P O Ws doing their housework, especially when scrubbing their large wooden dining table and chairs in the front garden. It was especially noticed that the Germans were most scrupulous with their cleaning, while the Italians were more laid back.

In time, my sisters, brother and I came to know each P O W by their Christian names – Willie (Wilhelm), Eric (Erich), Paul (Paol) and Phillip (Phillipp).There were one or two others whose names escape me after so many years!

Our German and Italian friends worked extremely hard and were very willing to do so. They enjoyed their apparent freedom on the farm, looking after the animals and also working on the land.

My sister Vivienne and I reminded Willie of the two young daughters he had left behind in Germany. Every evening he took his bible to read, inside of which was a beautiful photograph of his girls. My father told me later that Willie's wife had made a new life with another German soldier back in their homeland and because of this sad event Willie never saw his daughters again as far as I knew and after the Second World War had ended he remained in England for the rest of his life. As a family we were proud to have Willie as a dear and close friend.

It was pleasing to know that Willie made a happy life in St Albans with his new wife and 3 stepsons, two of whom my brother and I became friends with - Donald and

Len were their names. Willie worked at the St Albans Rubber Company until his retirement.

The ladies' man of the bunch was Eric who developed a soft spot for my eldest sister Pat who at the age of 16 completely ignored him! Then there was Paul, the vain one. He had a bad accident in the lane when falling off his bike. Gravel became embedded in Paul's face and he received hospital treatment. Because of his badly injured face Paul had no wish to receive visitors and if someone came to the cottage they were not allowed entrance until he had placed a towel over his face! As to Phillip, he was considered the arrogant one and did not mix very much at all with anyone although he was a kind friend to us children.

We learned a lot from our new found friends during visits after school; Willie taught me the wonderful art of darning. In our needlework class at school girls were asked to choose something to create and as a result of my producing a pair of neatly darned socks, I won a prize at the end of the school term. Their woodwork was really admired by many and the rope sandals they made were worn around the cottage as slippers with many pairs being given as gifts to their work mates. Meals were all from home cooking much of which was produced in a huge pot and boiled on the cooking range. We often were invited to supper!

Another lasting memory was of the POWs coming to our Bonfire Night on 5 November. They helped father stack the bonfire with rubber tyres, garden rubbish, fallen trees etc and at the top of which was the guy our mother had painstakingly made. We all enjoyed baked potatoes, chestnuts and toffee apples specially made for the occasion.

Although it was wartime, we children did not understand what was going on. All we knew was that we had made some wonderful friends from other countries. It was a very sad day for us when most went back home to Germany and Italy. •400,000 POWs were kept in hundreds of prison camps outside every major town in the country during WWII.

•During 1946, one in 5 farm labourers in Great Britain was a POW.The POWs were returned to their home countries after the war in a very leisurely fashion and many were detained until 1948.

•A list of POW camps was compiled by English Heritage in 2003 but this list is not complete. Sophie Jackson wrote a book in 2010 called 'Churchill's Unexpected Guests' which is the most complete account of POW camps in Great Britain.

•The most likely camp in the list from which the Lowbell Lane prisoners might have come is Camp No. 33 in Dancers Hill.That's about half a mile from Trotters Bottom on the other side of the St Albans Road.

•Most modern camp lists are based on archaeological work – ironic when the camps existed a mere 60 years ago.

•Records from the time give an insight into camp life and sometimes reveal the name of a camp, but often the documents didn't reveal the actual address, and prisoners were not allowed to write their camp address on any letters they sent home.

• In 2010 David Murray from Much Hadham, found over 2,000 artefacts in the garden of his bungalow which must have been built on the site of a POW camp. These included German soldiers' ID tags, badges, bottles and a live grenade which he attempted to defuse himself!

Voting Rights

Don't lose you right to vote - register now.

Residents in St Albans are being urged to return their Voter Registration Forms so they can vote in the Police and Crime Commissioner elections on 15 November.

St Albans City and District Council sent annual voter registration forms requesting elector information to more than 58,000 homes in the District in June. Residents are asked to complete and return the forms as soon as possible.

Mike Lovelady, Electoral Registration Officer for St Albans City and District, said: "We have had a good response so far, however, some households have still not yet registered. You have to be on the electoral register if you want to have your say in the first Police and Crime Commissioner elections in November."

"By the end of July, 56% of people eligible to vote in London Colney had registered, compared with 65% across the District. This was more than the proportion of people who were registered by this stage of the annual canvass last year. In 2012, the canvass resulted in 94.69 of eligible voters being registered. We are on course to achieve a similar percentage this year." "If you are eligible to vote, please return the form as soon as possible. Alternatively, if you have no changes to make to any of the details on the form you can register through the internet, freephone or text registration service. Details of this are given on the form."

The Council maintains the electoral register and is required by law to review it each year to make sure it has an up-todate register of electors who are eligible to vote in the District.

During September, canvassers have visited homes that have not returned the forms to request the information needed to compile an accurate revised register.

This year the annual review has been brought forward so that the register is updated prior to the Police and Crime Commissioner elections in November.

You can vote in local elections if you have registered to vote, are living in the UK and are either a British, Irish, qualifying Commonwealth or European Union Citizen. You can also vote if you are registered to vote as a Crown Servant or as a service voter.

The revised register will be published on 16 October 2012. There will be two versions – the full and the edited register. The edited register is available for marketing purposes and general sale. Residents can opt of this register by ticking the box marked 'Edited Register'. The person completing the form should ensure that everyone mentioned on the form is asked whether they want to be on the edited register.

The opt-out only lasts until the next annual canvass is carried out when residents will again be asked if they want to opt of the edited register. If residents want to be excluded from the edited register on a longer-term basis then they need to write to the Electoral Services Team at

St Albans City and District Council, Civic Centre, St Peter's Street, St Albans, ALI 3JE or send an email to elections@stalbans.gov.uk .

If electors are not on the register when it is published or move to a new address during the year, they can still register to vote by completing a registration form. The deadline to register to vote for the Police and Crime Commissioner elections is 31 October 2012.

Anyone unable to attend a polling station or wishes to vote by post on

15 November can apply for a postal vote by contacting the Electoral Services Team or downloading a form at: http:// www.aboutmyvote.co.uk

In case you haven't noticed, the destination board at the front of the single-deck Red bus that plies the route between Barnet and St. Albans via London Colney, now has a special message. It says 100 years old! to commemorate its centenary year from August 1912: a remarkable time!

The journey has varied somewhat during that period, which includes two World Wars, and the effects of modern motor travel on passenger needs.

The full story of this amazing saga is well told in Tony Billings' book '84 to St Albans' published in 2003, in a history of this famous route.

to Metroline, based in Potters Bar, and is more familiar to many than its smaller counterpart, which is similar to the Uno service in style. Both appear regularly at the Colney Fields connection, linking to many places around as far away as New Barnet on its earlier scheduled route. A truly iconic reminder of a century of change passing through London Colney.

We now have modern designs to replace the older versions (see photograph taken recently) which had solid tyres, outside stairs, open seating aloft, and the driver perched outside in the fresh air, as the whole contraption struggled to get up Ridge Hill - for a fraction of the fare today! It was a lifeline for many people to escape from London Town to see London Colney (or St Albans) instead, far away in the countryside beyond The Smoke...



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
