As I start to write the report I'm looking out my window and thinking what a horrible day, where is the warm weather we should be getting at this time of year? Not much chance of sitting out in the garden or lighting up the BBQ. But still we all keep going, as does your Parish Council.

This is one of our busiest times of year. Now that the football season has finished our grounds men are busy cutting grass on our pitches and in our play areas, keeping them in really tip top condition. This year we had 2 extra football teams playing on our new facilities at Napsbury along with

St Columba's college. They are also using the Facilities for Rugby, tennis, cricket and five a side. The Parish Council is putting in for planning permission for flood lighting on the MUGA so that it can be used all year round.

New Football Facilities at Shenley Lane

I'm excited to be able to tell you that I have been working with Len Rodell from London Colney Colts and Mike Woodhams who deals with our sports pitch bookings to provide new changing facilities on Shenley Lane with separate kitchen and toilet facilities for parents to use during games. It is planned that the allotment holders can also have use of these facilities. This is a joint venture with funding from the

Parish Council, the FA through Mike Woodhams and Grass Roots which is funding for junior Football and comes through London Colney Colts FC. Any additional work is to be done by Len Rodell at no cost to the council. I am really pleased that we have been able to work together to prove this new facility and would like to thank Mike and Len for their advice and support on this project. This is truly the community working together for the benefit of the village.


Cricket

Environment Action

Councillor Ken Bowes continues to chair a group of local residents and councillors on the Parish Environmental Action Plan (PEAP). They have produced an excellent, informative booklet with plans to help protect the environment we live in. this is a working document and can change to suit our needs. Thanks to Ken and his team for their continued good work.

Travellers - Gone

As most of you know we had a gypsy incursion on our Parish land at Napsbury Park the first weekend in May.The new Parish Chair, Dreda Gordon served them notice and had them off within hours of local residents informing her that they were there. The Parish Council would like to thank the Police for their backing with a number of police cars and a helicopter watching to make sure they left the village. Luckily they were not there long enough to make much mess.

Larks in the Parks

Don't forget Larks in the Parks are earlier this year, happening on the 20th of June. On Tues. 22nd June we will be celebrating the life of St. Alban with our annual walk to Chantry Island. An Interview with Moira White, Head Teacher of Bowmansgreen School



How long have you worked in the village? My 5 year anniversary at Bowmansgreen was on April 10.

When did you come here and where did you work before?
Have taught in 4 schools in St
Albans area, Skyswood, Redbourn
Jnr, Crabtree Jnr (as Headteacher)
& Bowmansgreen. My first job was in Eastleigh in Hampshire, following graduation from King Alfred's College, Winchester.

Why did you choose London Colney as the place to be a Head Teacher? Was asked to 'look at' Bowmansgreen by the School's Effectiveness Adviser who was desperately searching for the 'right person' following illness and subsequent long term absence of the previous, and highly committed, Headteacher. The school was in a period of instability and the Local Authority was looking for someone with experience, determination and passion for children's learning to take the school forward. As soon as I walked into the school and met Mr Wilding and Mrs Fisher, the school's deputy head and special needs coordinator, I knew that we could form a team to reinstate Bowmansgreen >> 4

as an outstanding school that would serve its community well. The school has incredible warmth and I immediately felt a sense of belonging. I still had to apply for the job in the usual way but was determined I would do all I could to be successful in the appointment process.

How is your school involved in village life? The school is increasingly involved in village life and is a regular participant in the switching on of the Christmas Lights and has demonstrated its maypole and country dancing and cheerleading squad at Larks in the Parks over the past three years. The school also initiated the London Colney Cup football tournament for the three primary schools. There is a whole range of after-school and holiday clubs/activities that take place at the school that are accessible to all children from the village and surrounding areas. The school is an active member of the Extended School Consortium (the four village schools plus How Wood, Park Street, Killigrew and Mount Pleasant Lane) and is leading on sharing best practice amongst staff in curriculum opportunities across the group.

What part of your work gives you the most satisfaction?

Seeing children proud of their own achievement and helping them to acknowledge that the greatest sense of success comes from within themselves; whether children are proud of a piece of work, delighted they have bettered a previous best in any of their achievements or have managed their emotions. Children and their parents are delighted to receive a surprise 'cockerel card' home in the post that celebrates their success.

What do you enjoy doing when you are not working?

Family and friends are at their heart of my home life. I have a seventeen year old doing his A levels (any parents who have been through the same will know what is required to keep him on track with his homework! And to

manage his anti-social hours!) I enjoy cooking and will spend a lot of time browsing through cookery books and magazines to entertain friends. Obviously to develop my culinary skills it is important to eat out too!! I am a reader (see below). As far as fitness goes, the children will tell you that my personal goal last year was to increase the amount of walking I do each week and having worn a pedometer for the first three months 2009, I am pleased I have maintained that goal. I'm usually out and about at weekends. I am lucky to have a brother who is a skiinstructor and, along with my sister's family, we have a week together in the Alps each year. My brother is highly critical if I am unable to keep up the pace!

Do you any voluntary work and how did you get involved in this activity? One of the highlights in my year is helping with the Harpenden Gang Show. Throughout the year I am part of the Wardrobe Team who meets to plan and create the costumes for the annual performance. Last year I sewed 150 glittery waistcoats to celebrate the show's 60th anniversary. My dining room floor was covered in seguins from October to January! When it comes to performance week, I am behind the scenes each evening assisting with ironing, swift costume changes and employing my professional voice to guieten the 60 scouts in between acts. I have been involved since my son took part in the 55th show and already anticipating next year's 62nd.

Have you any unrealised ambitions? I love dancing and feel there is a bit of a Dancing Queen inside me! I am sure it is a hidden talent and not to be shared!

What book are you reading at the moment and are you enjoying it? I am an avid reader and belong to two book groups. I do try to keep up with what the groups read but it really is far too ambitious an aim! I am always keen to try something new but

a couple of favourites have been The Time Traveller's Wife and We Need to Talk About Kevin. Both were written in a style that kept me interested until the end.

Is there anything you'd like to tell the people of London Colney? Come and visit and feel the warmth of a Bowmansgreen welcome! We are all really proud of our recent Ofsted inspection which confirmed that our hard work in recent years to improve our school has been successful! There is a calm, purposeful working atmosphere which allows for good fun, achievement and a genuine sense of belonging to the family of Bowmansgreen. We are constantly looking to extend the range of opportunities we can offer our children so if you feel you have a skill or an interest to share with the school we would love to hear from you, e.g. gardening, arts and crafts, or simply time to talk and share learning with the children. Bowmansgreen is entering another exciting phase of development and would like the village community to play a greater part in it.

What piece of general advice from your own experience would you give to a young! old person?

Nothing is insurmountable! There are always people who will listen, help and support. I am a firm believer that we achieve far more when we work together rather than in isolation. (Hence our commitment to leading the partnership with other schools in the consortium) By talking things through, a solution is often reached far more quickly. At Bowmansgreen children can seek out a friend from amongst the adults or the children and know they will be supported whatever their need.

World Wildlife

British Butterflies were recorded at their lowest numbers for 25 years in 2008.

Eight species were found to be at an all time low according to the British Butterfly Conservation charity. Butterflies in the UK rely on good summer weather, tey cannot fly in heavy rain which affects their breeding, feeding and laying season but a drought also causes food shortage.

The eight endangered species as records show are the Common Blue (down 78%), Small Skipper (down 64%, Small Tortoiseshell (down 81%) and Wall Brown (down 62%), all illustrated below.

The rremainder are Speckled Wood (down 35%), Chalk Hill Blue (down 50%), Lulworth Skipper (down 73%) and the Grayling (down 42%). I hope to paint the latter four in a future issue.

The Butterfly Conservation claim that butterflies are facing mounting threats,



Gardening

Going on holiday can pose particular problems in the garden especially how to ensure that precious plants don't suffer whilst there is no-one there to pander to their needs. As well as deciding what clothes to pack and remembering to cancel the papers, some thought needs to go into how to prepare the garden so it will survive the absence. Usually there is enough rain to provide sufficient water for basic needs, but the weather can be unpredictable. If there is plenty of rain for the borders the lawn will also put on a growth spurt. It is perhaps not a good idea to plant a thirsty plant just before going away. Cutting the lawn just before going will reduce the work needed on return. In summer I have an automatic irrigation system which keeps pots and crops sufficiently watered, if the battery on the timer does not go flat. Loss of water from summer terracotta pots can be reduced by lining the pot with a plastic bag and including water retention crystals in the compost when planting.



Going away means the garden has more opportunity than usual to grow out of control. Those flowers which readily self seed might need dead heading before leaving even if still in full flower to reduce the task of having to remove any unwanted seedlings the following year. I have this particular problem with ox-eyed daisies as their self seeding is rather too prolific. However, I find it rather difficult to remove a flower in full bloom and don't always manage to get this done.

Going away also means that the



flowering of favourites may be missed whatever the time of year. We have just returned home from a slightly longer than planned holiday and it has led me to think about which plants I would have missed whilst I was away if my absence had been even more prolonged. When the children were at school, holidays were limited by school times and so the longer absence would be in late July/August. At this time of year the garden can be particularly flat after the flush of flowers in May and June, so I was not too concerned about missing anything. Now I am more likely to be at home at this time of year as I have more choice over the timing of my travels so I have put some effort into the mid to late summer garden, but of course I now miss favourites at other times of the year.

I have been away in spring when it can be particularly difficult to predict what will be in flower during my absence as this depends very much on how hard a winter there has been. I have just managed to totally miss a rather lovely erythronium which flowered for the first time this year, the yellow bell shaped flowers just developing on our

departure and already fading on our return. I also missed tulips at their best and a clump of narcissi which has taken a few years to develop to its present size. Last year a holiday in early July meant that I missed my stargazer lilies at their best, but fortunately managed to enjoy my regal lilies as they flowered a little earlier. I also missed philadelphus at its most fragrant and a September holiday saw me missing the virginia creeper at its most fiery. There are those favourites that I would be particularly sad to miss, bearded irises in early to mid May, oriental poppies in early June, jasmine in midsummer. Now that I am also growing vegetables, our recent holiday caused us to miss half of this year's crop of purple sprouting broccoli and there had to be careful planning of sowing and planting out other crops.

So when planning a holiday the timing of all things horticultural is likely to be in the back of my mind. However, as much as I love my garden and hate to miss my favourite plants, they will return to be enjoyed the following year, and I will not let it stop me planning and enjoying future travels.

It's easy to miss, but there is a church on Kings Road, London Colney. It's got a cross on the top and a big sign saying church, but somehow people still seem to not realise it's there. Even some taxi drivers scratch their heads, when I ask them to drop me off here



So just in case you don't know about us, we just want to say hi and that we are here for you. Some people might never dream of trying out their local church, especially if (like me) they never went to one growing up. Yet, it can be a great way to meet new people while exploring the big issues of life. There are various activities going on at the church, here's a quick run down of the main ones.

Sunday Service, 10:30-11:30am In our Sunday morning service you can expect the following: Things for Children: During the service we have a fun and interactive Children's Talk as well as an optional Sunday School. We have a crèche area for those with younger children. (We operate a Child Safety policy and all helpers are police checked - CRB). Sermon: We have a weekly sermon/ talk. 



A child was born in an obscure village, the son of a peasant woman. He grew up in another village, where

he worked in a carpenter's shop until he was thirty. Then for three years he became a wandering preacher. He never wrote a book. He never held a public office. He never raised an army. He never had a family or owned a home. He didn't go to college. He never travelled two hundred miles from the place where he was born. He gathered a little group of friends about him and taught them his way of life. While still a young man, the tide of public opinion turned against him. One friend denied him, another betraved him. He was turned over to his enemies. went through a mockery of a trial, and was nailed to a cross between two thieves. While he was dying, his execu-

tioners gambled for his clothing, the only property he had on earth. He was laid in a borrowed grave by the kindness of a friend, but later rose from the dead. These are the facts of his human life. Two thousand years have come and gone, and what kind of trail has he left across the centuries? When we try to sum up his influence, all the armies that ever marched, all the navies that ever sailed, all the parliaments that ever sat, all the kings that ever reigned, put together, have not affected the life of man on earth as much as that one solitary life.

This article by lames Francis (1864-1928) refers to Jesus Christ, whose birth Christians remember at Christmas and whose death and resurrection we remember at Easter. He claimed to be the son of God, so he was either a liar, a lunatic, or truly God's messenger to us.
